

## Checklist of Items to Include in an Emergency Kit

Every household should be prepared to be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours. Keep in mind that a power failure can mean no heat or drinkable water.

- Water (one gallon per person per day)
- Food (non-perishable, rotate stock)
- Mess Kits (can opener, disposable cups, plates, and utensils)
- Flashlight and Extra Batteries
- First Aid Kit
- Whistle (to signal for help)
- Battery Operated Radio/Extra Batteries
- Dust Masks, Plastic Sheeting, and Duct Tape
- Matches in a Waterproof Container
- Copies of Important Documents (insurance policies, identification, and bank account records)
- Sleeping Bags/Warm Blankets
- Maintain sump pump in operating condition with provision for power failure
- Generator (never use indoors, in garage, or near doors, windows, and vents; do not use in wet conditions; properly ground; practice electrical safety; turn off and cool before fueling)
- Unique Family Needs (extra prescription medications, infant formula, diapers)

## **Hazard Analysis**

The CRC has conducted a Hazard Analysis Workshop HAZNY (Hazards New York). Twenty-three hazards potentially affecting the Town of Manlius and/or the Villages of Fayetteville, Manlius, and Minoa were analyzed and rated based on each hazard's "credible worse case scenario" assessment. The hazards analyzed are listed below under the rating of "Moderately High Hazard," "Moderately Low Hazard," and "Low Hazard." There were no hazards rated under the "High Hazard" category. Look at the moderately high hazards and build your family emergency plan around it.

### ***Moderately High Hazards***

- ◆ Severe Storm
- ◆ Flood
- ◆ Ice Storm
- ◆ Winter Storm

### ***Moderately Low Hazard***

- ◆ Epidemic
- ◆ Air Contamination
- ◆ Fire
- ◆ Extreme Temperatures
- ◆ Transportation Accident
- ◆ Tornado
- ◆ Water Supply Contamination
- ◆ Dam Failure
- ◆ Utility Failure
- ◆ Hazardous Materials in Transit
- ◆ Earthquake
- ◆ Terrorism
- ◆ Wildfire
- ◆ Structural Collapse

### ***Low Hazard***

- ◆ Hazardous Material at Fixed Sites
- ◆ Explosion
- ◆ Oil Spill
- ◆ Radiological Materials in Transit
- ◆ Landslide

## **Working as a Community**

During a disaster, emergency services personnel may not be able to reach everyone right away, leaving the first line of defense to be you, your family, and your neighbors.

- ◆ Find out who has specialized equipment (like power generator or communications equipment) or expertise (such as medical knowledge) that might help in a crisis.
- ◆ When a hazard happens, find out where shelters are being set up. Remember it may be safer to stay in your house.
- ◆ Decide who will check on and assist elderly neighbors or persons with special needs (mobility impaired, hearing or sight problems).
- ◆ Know which radio and television station to listen to for emergency broadcasts.
- ◆ Organize work parties to clear streets and hydrants for emergency vehicles if it is safe to do so.
- ◆ Work out a plan with neighbors to contact emergency personnel and have a neighborhood meeting area arranged.
- ◆ Make back-up plans for children in case you can't get home in an emergency, and know your children's school plan. Have a trusted neighbor's name on school records in case you cannot pick up your children.
- ◆ Develop a family emergency plan before a hazard occurs. Discuss how you and your family should respond to each possible hazard. Create two meeting places, one right outside the home and one outside the neighborhood.
